Kew Plaza Map

On 24th June we unveiled the new map for visitors which we have been working on with the National Archives, their contractors, Bouygues who generously re-furnished the structure holding the map pro bono, the Royal Botanic Gardens, the Kew Residents Association and Richmond Council. We hope it will help visitors to find the Royal Botanic Gardens, the National Archives, the Crematorium, Kew Green and the River more easily. It will not solve all the problems but is a start. We are continuing to work with the Council on improving signage from the station.

The Kew Traders Association told us “The new map is a massive improvement on the old one – crisp and clear. Visitors to Kew often come into the shops in our Village to ask for directions. Whilst it's nice to see them, so many lost visitors says a lot about why we needed this new map on Kew Plaza. Improved signage on the other side of the station would help too.”

We are lucky to have world renowned sites which attract visitors from all over the world. We hope visitors as well as residents will like the new design and we will continue to work on more improvements

Heathrow Expansion Latest News

Here are two dates for your diary:

- Thursday 8th October: the Richmond Society's Forum meeting at 19.45 at the Duke Street Church, Richmond will focus on Heathrow expansion. Come along to hear the latest update and ask questions of the Richmond Heathrow Campaign (RHC). The cost is a £2.00 donation to the Richmond Society. Doors open at 19.15 with hot and cold drinks.
- Saturday 10th October at 11.00 in central London: a newly formed "Coalition against Heathrow expansion," including the RHC, is holding a No Heathrow 3rd Runway Protest. Please hold the date to come along if you are opposed to Heathrow expansion. The venue will be publicised soon.

The Airports Commission final report to Government favoured Heathrow expansion on economic grounds but did not rule out Gatwick. There were a number of caveats in the recommendation, including the need to comply with legally binding air quality standards currently not being met. Take a look at our website www.kewsociety.org for direct links to the Commission's report and the response by the RHC.

Parliament's Environmental Audit Committee is holding an inquiry "into the implications of the recommendation for Government's commitment on carbon emissions, air quality and noise should the recommendation of a third runway at Heathrow be adopted". The RHC is submitting evidence, by the deadline of 3rd September. It will build on evidence already assembled in its new website www.rhcfacts.org which is being updated now with the final data from the Commission, though these data do not change the summary conclusions reached. The RHC wrote to all MPs with these facts just before publication of the Commission's report. The web site enables decision makers to drill down to the supporting evidence – do take a look yourself.

A new Cabinet sub-committee has also been formed, chaired by the Prime Minister (the Economic Affairs (Airports) sub-Committee), to "consider matters relating to airport capacity in the South East of England in the light of the Airports Commission's report". The RHC is looking at what evidence to submit to Cabinet Office for the Committee to consider.

Brentford Football Stadium

The Public Inquiry into the Compulsory Purchase Order for Brentford Football Club forcibly to acquire the remainder of the site opened on Tuesday 8th September, running into the following week. Sadly, the Committee had to conclude that the Society's resources were inadequate to meet the full costs of engaging Counsel and three expert witnesses formally to appear on the Society's behalf but our original objection remains regarding the "enabling development" and its traffic and pollution consequences. We have informed the Inspector that, where their case matches ours, we support the objection of the major remaining landowner. Members of the Committee are attending parts of the Inquiry, alongside other Community Groups north of the River.

We still await the outcome of our application to the Information Commissioner for the full release of the confidential development appraisals used by the London Borough of Hounslow and the football club to justify the planning consent for the 910 tower block flats and hotel, the profits from which are said to be needed to fund the stadium. The football club's owner appears also to own another club in Denmark.

Multiple reserved matters planning applications have recently been made by the club and its development partner, Willmott Dixon, to Hounslow Council regarding the detailed design of the enabling development.

Town Planning

The Society's representations in respect of many planning matters can appear negative but we were pleased recently to be able to make representations in favour of the application by the Village Bookshop owner to reface the shop's side elevation. That application has subsequently been approved.

Old Inland Revenue Site

Formal planning approval for the re-development of this site was given on 22nd May following finalisation of the Section 106 agreement which contains the requirement for the GP surgery. For those who could not get to the public exhibition organised by Taylor Wimpey you can view the display boards they prepared at <https://www.taylorwimpey.co.uk/proposed-developments/england/london/richmond/bessant-drive>. Discussions are on-

going with NHS England for the fit-out costs of the new GP surgery as part of the scheme. This will provide expanded accommodation for the current North Road surgery which has specified their requirements at the new site. (The surgery needs to move from its current location as its lease expires). We are keeping in touch with Richmond Council and with Taylor Wimpey on progress.

Events

June proved to be an exciting month for the Events team. Our stand at The Kew Midsummer Fete on Saturday 20th looked splendid and attracted much attention with winning photographs from our 'Eye on Kew' competition on display. A panel of local, professional judges had selected prize winners and the standard was high. The competition had been promoted to local schools and Krishnan Guru-Murthy, Channel 4 News Reporter, did a splendid job awarding the prizes at the Fete.
